



Colonel Mahlon Burwell, a devout Anglican, donated the land for this cemetery and church and was buried here along with his wife, Sarah. This rural location was known as Burwell's Corners as the family had a house, farm and the land registry office on the northwest corner. All the buildings are gone now.

Burwell was a Member of the House of Assembly several times for the County of Middlesex and once for the Town of London, a Lieutenant-Colonel in the War of 1812, and Colonel during the Rebellion of 1837. He surveyed much of the area as far west as Essex and east to Haldimand at the behest of Colonel Thomas Talbot.



**Burwell**

Large, flat stones held erect by columns. Conservation work was undertaken in 2014 and an interpretive sign about Burwell's participation in the War of 1812 was added. Mahlon Burwell was born in New Jersey on February 18, 1783 and died January 25, 1846 aged 62 years 11 months and 7 days. His parents were United Empire Loyalists who moved to Upper Canada in 1796. His wife Sarah Haun died August 25, 1870 aged 80 years 9 months and 2 days.



**Bobier**

Large square black granite stone with pillared levels and bottom two are cement, steepled top with an urn. Masonic symbol on the top of the west side. Mary, wife of William Bobier, died July 13, 1913 aged 80 years. William F. Bobier 1873 - 1949. William Bobier died September 29, 1894 aged 72 years. A native of County Wexford, Ireland. Annie M. Graham (1884-1955), wife of Harry Bobier (1874-1962). Thomas Sloan (1864-1953) and his wife Margaret Bobier (1871-1954).

**Braddon**

Small white limestone with floral design. In memory of Mary Isabella, daughter of John M. Braddon and Margaret R. Lunn born August 29, 1881 and died December 15, 1882 aged 1 year 3 months and 16 days. "Sweet cherub child! Twas well for thee to leave life's thorny path untold and haste with vestures yet all free from earthly taint, back to thy God."

### Waite

George and Hannah owned the Land and Fisheries at the southwest corner of Lake Road and Iona Road. Also buried here is their son George Waite 1856-1940 and his wife Lodica Miller 1858 –1942. George was injured while working at a sawmill. He lost a leg just above the knee. Little to no help was given to someone who had a workplace injury of this type.

### Cascaden

John Cascaden M.D. came from Donegal, Ireland, lived in Southwold Township as a child, went to the University of Toronto, then England and Scotland for post-graduate work. He returned to Iona to practice medicine and become the Elgin County Coroner, then an MPP. When he retired from politics, he moved to Dutton to continue his practice until his death. Also buried here is his wife Hannah Katherine DeCow and their son, David Arthur, who died in his 4th year.

### Clark

Nathan Clark was born September 15, 1883 in Southwold Township. His date of death is not marked on the stone, which is unusual. His wife, Margaret Joann Keillor, born in Southwold Township, died August 23, 1912 aged 74 years and 2 months. Rachel T. Clark, their fourth daughter, died August 10, 1884 aged 20 years 1 month and 4 days.
